Obituary – John William Wheeler

John William Wheeler was born in Sydney on Anzac Day 1948, the son of Roy and Enid Wheeler, and the grandson of an original Anzac. The family moved to Canberra, where John attended Lyneham High School.

John was keen to pursue a career in the Army, and was accepted into the Royal Military College, Duntroon in January 1966. He graduated in December 1969, and was allocated to the Infantry Corps, with the rank of Lieutenant.

In January 1970 John was posted to the 3rd Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, based in Woodside, South Australia. In 1970 the Battalion was preparing for a second tour of Vietnam. John assumed command of 10 Platoon, D Company and spent that year training and readying his platoon for active service.

The 3rd Battalion arrived in Vietnam at the end of February 1971, and began familiarisation operations, in an area of supposed low enemy activity. That turned out not to be the case.

On the night of 2 March 1971, the rifle Companies of the Battalion took up defensive positions east of the Australian base in Nui Dat. Later that night, D Company came under attack by a Viet Cong force. John was moving between defensive positions, supporting and encouraging the men of 10 Platoon, when he was killed in a large explosion. Private Paul Manning was also killed that night, and Privates Strickland and Hammond were seriously wounded.

John Wheeler was 22 years old when he died. He was survived by his parents, and by his brother David and his sisters, Ruth and Louise. The remains of Lieutenant John William Wheeler rest in this place, Norwood Park Crematorium. A Memorial Plaque is installed at Lyneham High School, Goodwin Street, Lyneham ACT

Lt John William Wheeler is inscribed on the Roll Of Honour at the Australian War Memorial, among the more than 500 Australian servicemen who died while serving in the Vietnam War.

Remember Them 3rd Battalion RAR Vietnam 1971

12th February – 16th October 1971

"Old Faithful", 3rd Battalion The Royal Australian Regiment's (3RAR), second tour of duty in the Republic of South Vietnam commenced on 12th February 1971.

During 1971 the Battalion participated in ten diverse operations from search and destroy, ambush, bunker assault, armoured and air assault. The Battalion's first contact took place only four days after arrival in-country. The following night the VC probed D Coy defensive position for nine hours but were beaten off with superior fire and air support. Lt John Wheeler and Cpl Paul Manning were killed in this engagement.

Op Briar Patch 1, the unit's next operation, was a search operation to the north and east of the Horseshoe. On 17th March 9 Pl C Coy engaged a group of four VC, On 20th March half of 8 Pl C Coy contacted HQ D445 in a bunker system north of Xuyen Moc resulting in the death of 2Lt David Paterson and Pilot Officer Ron Betts, co-pilot of Bushranger 71. 3RAR, reinforced by companies of 2 RAR/NZ (ANZAC) Battalion with artillery and armoured support began searching west of Xuyen Moc.

The enemy were located on 31 March and a fierce contact followed. One member of A Coy 2RAR/NZ Battalion and a crewman of a 'DUSTOFF' helicopter were killed. The direct support helicopter with the CO on board was shot down but the pilot and CO were unhurt.

Op Overlord, the last Task Force operation of the Vietnam war, commenced on 5 June with the newly arrived 4RAR/NZ (ANZAC) Battalion, 2/8th US Cavalry with tanks, APCs and artillery supporting 3RAR searching for 3/33 Regt and D445 Battalion in Long Khanh Province. Contact was made by 5 Platoon B Coy on the 7th June resulting in the enemy fleeing but not before 9 Sqn RAAF Flight Lieutenant Everitt Murray "Lofty" Lance, 9Sqn RAAF Cpl David John Dubber MID and Lt Ian Mathers, Artillery FO were killed.

On 18th June the Battalion deployed on Op Hawker during which the Aslt Pl Pnr, 2Pl A Coy and then 9 Pl C Coy all had contacts with the enemy. During Op Iron Fox the Battalion established a blocking position for 4RAR/NZ Battalion which experienced heavy contact with 1/274 VC Regt. During Op Inverbrackie B Coy and 8 Pl C Coy both engaged enemy elements.

On the 18th August the Prime Minister announced the withdrawal of the Task Force by Christmas. The next and last major engagement involved B Coy on 31st August and 1st September.

Operations in Vietnam concluded on the 1st October, the Battalion departed Vietnam on HMAS Sydney on the 6th October and returned to Adelaide, Australia on the 16th October.
